Grace is Reopening on October 4th - Here's the new reality By Colleen Harding, reopening committee



After being closed for services for the past six months, Grace Church is making plans to reopen for in-person services on October 4th. However, it will not be a return to services as we remember them. Our Reopening Committee has drawn up a proposal based on regulations set out by the Province and the Health Unit. This is a snapshot of what we think church will look like on October 4th.

Entering the Sanctuary

You will enter through the Pine Street door. As you arrive you will be asked some questions related to Covid-19, and we will take attendance and record contact information.

Masks still mandatory

Masks will be mandatory. When you are in the building you will be expected to wear a mask that covers your mouth, nose and chin. <u>If you cannot wear a mask for a medical reason</u>, then a facial shield that comes below your chin and wraps around the sides of your face will be acceptable. However, a mask is more effective protection.

Keeping your distance

Physical distancing will be expected. Pews will be marked to ensure recommended spacing. Persons from the same household or social circle can be seated together, but a 2-metre space must be maintained between all others. Ushers will assist you to find seating. Once you are seated, we will ask you to remain in your seat.

Silent Singing

Singing is considered a high-risk activity for the spread of the Covid-19 virus. However, hymns will still be included in the service. Hymns will be played on the organ and the words will be printed in the bulletin, but you will be invited to stay seated and "sing silently" in your head and hum along. And as long as we don't shout, we can participate in unison prayers, and responsive readings. They will also be in the bulletin.

Socialize outside

There will be no socializing within the building - so no coffee time before the service and no visiting at the coat rack. You are welcome to greet friends outside after the service, but we still encourage social distancing. Children are welcome, of course, but they must remain with their parents. There will be no Sunday School at this time.

Offerings, hymn books and earbuds

There are many things we cannot share. If you wish to use the hearing assist devices, you will need to bring your own earbuds or headphones, as we cannot share these. We also cannot pass the offering plates. The offering plates will be available at the entrance and the exits so you can drop your offering in the plate as you arrive or leave. Alternatively, we will be encouraging you to consider other ways to support the church through PAR, direct deposits, e-transfers or donations on our webpage. Hymn books and Bibles have been removed from the pews, but will

be available as you arrive if you would like to have one. Books used must be collected and set aside for 7 days as quarantine.

Services will be live streamed

Even with these changes in place and with the extra cleaning required, it is still recommended that people over the age of 70 or with underlying medical conditions or immunocompromised family members not attend services. But we have not forgotten you! We are also making plans to stream services live on the internet, probably via Facebook. However, you will not need to have a Facebook account to view the service. We will email you a link to watch the service as it is happening, or later at your convenience. We will also send you a link to the bulletin which you can print out. The words for the hymns will not be posted on the screen but we can lend you a hymnbook if you wish. Contact the church office at 613-382-2161 or Paul Harding at 613-382-2405 and let us know if you want music or words only, and your address. We will bring you a book that you can borrow until things return to normal.

Let us know if you are attending

This pandemic is far from over. As we move forward with our reopening it is important that we are more vigilant than ever. While we may feel that worship services are essential, we need to proceed carefully. This plan will help us do that. There is a cap on the number of people we can accommodate, so if you are planning to attend on October 4th, please call the church office at 613-382-2161 to reserve your spot. 

Lighting

The new LED lighting is now installed in the sanctuary. Those that have seen it were very impressed with the brightness and overall appearance that the new bulbs bring to our Church. The Company who installed the new lights estimated that the old bulbs used, on an annual basis, 37,019 KWH (kilowatt hours) of electricity. The new bulbs will use only 7,207 KWH. They estimated that the annual cost of lighting the sanctuary was \$4,442. The new cost is estimated to be \$864. An annual savings of \$3,578.

Battle with the birds.

Thanks to Murray Roantree, yours truly and the JET Electric bucket truck, the bird spikes are now over the Stone Street Tower door. The ledge was larger than anticipated so we may have one or two visitors, but not the dozen or so that were there each night before the spikes were put up.

The elevator

The elevators annual inspection has been completed and everything is good to go, with one exception. The bottom of the shaft must be repainted. This will be done by the elevator company as soon as they can. They are from Ottawa. In the mean time the elevator is working fine and can be used by the Church.

Another 200 pies sold in two days! - By Paul Scott

Thank goodness the Pies for God's Sake committee keeps making pies. These delicious desserts continue to be a popular item in this community.

On Thursday and Friday, August 27 and 28, and with Covid protocols in place, another 200 pies were sold adding a further \$2,400 plus a \$400 donation was received.

There are still some pies available for sale (\$12.00 each) and you can find out what is still available and arrange pick up by calling the church office (613-382-2161) on Tuesdays or Thursdays between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. When going to the church to pick up, call ahead, make sure you wear a mask and use the hand sanitizer upon entering.

Meanwhile the Pies for God's Sake team continue making more pies which will be available in early December.



Offerings stay strong, expenses down – we can do this! By Vicki Leakey, treasurer

We have the August financial update and...wow, just wow!!

I am so pleased to inform you that we have been able to maintain 98% of the offerings that we received in the same 8-month period in 2019. This is excellent work, folks!

Our total revenue is 75% compared to 2019, however; in 2019 we had to draw \$30,000 more out of trust funds than we have had to withdraw in the current year.

Mission and Service receipts are 79% of what we received in 2019, still showing strong giving's for the many worthwhile M and S projects.

Total operating expenses are lower - 83% of the 2019 expenses, with most savings being in salaries, as was expected.

More good news. With the government programs that were made available to help employers like us continue with full time staff, we have not had to reduce hours or cut time for contract work. Laurie has been on top of the required eligibility, so we continue to maximize the subsidies that are made available to reduce staff costs.

As of the end of August, we have been able to maintain a surplus of \$5,460. But here's the challenge. We truly hope to work towards finding new fundraising options in the fall and encourage our church family members to continue with their contributions so we can maintain our financial health.

Again, there are several Offerings' options available which you may consider. **E-transfer** from your on-line bank account is popular. Look for "send an e-transfer" and send to grace.gan@outlook.com. Just follow the instructions given.

If more convenient, you may drop an **Envelope in the mail box** at the Pine St. choir door on Thursdays before 1:00 pm that day as Laurie will be at the church office and will make sure contributions are safely received. **Offerings by mail** is another option – send by mail to Grace Church at 120 Pine St. Gananoque, On K7G 1C7. We are so thankful for your continued support.

We wish to give each and every one of you the full appreciation you all deserve. We all need to remain aware that many are not doing so well during the constraints of the pandemic and be sure to communicate through our church office of any assistance we may, as a group, be able to provide.

Our Grace United Church family has much for which to be proud. Together, we will stay strong and be ready to welcome Rev. Takouhi in November.
